Browning Silver Mossy Oak Duck Blind No. 011366604 3-inch 20 Gauge, \$1,064 GUN TESTS GRADE: B

Gads, more than a thousand MSRP for a duck-blind gun? No thanks, our testers said—we're a lot harder on our stuff than that. Still, this was a smoothly functioning gun that had only minor issues that many readers will wave off as differences of opinion.

Mossberg SA-20 No. 75771 3-Inch 20 Gauge, \$496 GUN TESTS GRADE: B-/A

If the bolt release and loadinggate release button is a problem you don't want to deal with-as it was for us—then take the lower grade. If you're used to that sequence and can adapt, then this is an awful lot of gun for the money.

Remington 11-87 Sportsman No. 29825 3-Inch 20 Gauge, \$757 GUN TESTS GRADE: A-

In many ways, the 11-87 succeeded by not being really bad at anything. It wasn't the lightest

gun, but it wasn't heavy either. Its trigger wasn't outstanding, but it wasn't bad. It wasn't the easiest to operate, but everything worked as we expected. It wasn't the most expensive, nor was it the least expensive. Thus, there can be a good argument made that the Sportsman is a B+ gun, and if the gentle reader wishes to downgrade the 11-87 on his own scorecard, then we wouldn't be put-off by that. But if we were spending our money, we'd buy the Remington ahead of the others.
