Kel-Tec P3AT 380 ACP, \$324	June 2008	Grade A: If there's a better 380 concealment handgun than the P3AT, we would like to know what it is.
Beretta Cheetah M84 LS 380 Auto, \$652	Nov. 2002	Grade A (Our Pick): A higher capacity option with more class and charm than heavier recoiling plastic guns.
Ruger LCP 380 ACP, \$330	June 2008	Grade A-: The Ruger LCP ran reliably, did what it was designed to do, and looked good doing it.
Colt Mustang Pocketlite 380 ACP, about \$500	April 2003	Grade A- (Buy It): We would carry the Pocketlite as backup to a more powerful weapon.
Walther PPK 380 ACP, \$556	Feb. 2008	Grade B+: Clean lines, aura you can cut with a knife, and perfect function. S&W-made.
North American Arms Guardian 380 Auto, \$359	Nov. 2002	<b>Grade B (Buy It):</b> Viewed as a semiauto version of the derringer, the Guardian succeeds quite nicely.
Colt Mustang 380 ACP, about \$500	April 2003	Grade B (Conditional Buy): The all-steel Mustang had nothing to offer that the aluminum version couldn't do.
Walther USA PPK VAHAH38002 380 ACP, \$573	June 2008	<b>Grade C:</b> Despite very good accuracy and reliability, we didn't like shooting the PPK.
Beretta 85 FS Cheetah 380 ACP, \$575	April 2006	Grade C (Conditional Buy): We would not call the Cheetah a pocket gun, nor did we think it ideal in self-defense mode.
Firearms International 380 ACP, \$300	April 2003	Grade C (Conditional Buy): Its big problem was sticking open after every shot unless the safety was held down.
HHPoint Model CF 380 ACP, \$135	Feb. 2008	Grade C+: Ungainly, but totally reliable. Top-heavy and had a too-slick grip.
Taurus PT138BP-12, 1-138031P-12 380 ACP, \$419	June 2008	Grade D: Sights didn't match point of aim to point of impact and nagging malfunctions haunted its action.
Walther PPK 380 ACP, \$543	April 2006	Grade F (Don't Buy): The failure of several rounds to fire in DA mode meant that this gun didn't work as designed.
North American Arms Guardian 380 ACP, \$449	April 2006	<b>Grade F (Don't Buy):</b> In a tight situation, we didn't want to fight a balky trigger and pathetic accuracy.
Iver Johnson Pony 380 ACP, \$250	April	Grade F (Don't Buy): We could not get it to feed anything,
